"There was no other place that we would have it," says Allison (nee Brough), who has been coming to her family's cottage on Lake of Bays since she was five years old. "It's really special to us because ever since Blair and I got together, we have been going up to the cottage almost every weekend in the summer and in the winter."

Not surprisingly, they chose the Bigwin Island Golf Club to host their Sept. 19, 2015 wedding. To give guests from out of town and beyond that full Muskoka experience, Allison and Blair rented lodges around Lake of Bays and even stocked them with welcome baskets.

"Guests began arriving early on Friday so they got to enjoy the lake," Blair says. "It's that whole feeling and all the components of being up there were part of the wedding. It wasn't just a one-night affair."

And rather than the usual shuttle bus to the wedding reception, guests got to cruise the waters of Lake of Bays as they made their way to Bigwin Island.

"We wanted to have something lakeside where people could go back to a campfire at the end of the night and take a boat over to the island for the wedding," Blair says.

While Allison's family and friends have cottages around the lake, many members of Blair's family were coming from other parts of Canada, the United States and even Holland, so he was particularly eager to show them Muskoka.

"They were very impressed about being on the lake and you just don't have that sort of thing in Holland or a lot of places in Europe," he says of his guests from overseas.

As they waited for the S.S. Bigwin to arrive to take the wedding party to the island, Allison and Blair spent a few minutes fishing off the dock to ease jittery nerves.

"I was just trying to have some fun between all the tense moments," says Blair, "and seeing if we were going to get a bite, but we didn't."

It's not every day that a century-old steamship docks at your cottage, but the *S.S. Bigwin* was only fitting for Allison and Blair's classic wedding on Lake of Bays. Built in 1910, the elegant 66-foot steamship transported passengers to Bigwin Island for 45 years before falling into a state of disrepair. It was restored in 2012

and now sails the lake once again.

"Sailing on the boat was so magical. The skies cleared as we poured Champagne and toasted the day," says Allison. "Our guests were all coming in on the boats around us so we were waving as they sped by. I ran into the hull of the boat so no one saw my dress."

She adds, "It all felt surreal, like we went back in time – very glamorous."

When the ship arrived at Bigwin Island, over 200 guests awaited, eager to steal a glimpse the guests of honour. While dark clouds threatened rain, the mood was light as friends and family sat lakeside to witness the union.

"My biggest highlight was watching Ali walk down the aisle with her dad by the lake," says Blair. "The ominous dark clouds seemed to part right as the ceremony happened. It just came together. That was my favourite moment."

Dinner, which was held under a clear big-top style tent, left guests star struck as they gazed up at the night sky. Rather than try to add pizzazz to a traditional white tent, Allison wanted Muskoka's natural beauty to take the place of elaborate décor. With white candles, simple floral arrangements and strands of lights running overhead, Mother Nature set the tone at dinner.
